STUDY TO WORK IN NEW ZEALAND

Students graduating with a bachelor's degree, bachelor honours degree, postgraduate diploma, master's or doctoral degree and who have studied that programme full time in New Zealand for a minimum of 30 weeks will be eligible to apply for post-study work rights. The duration of post-study work visas now match the duration of a student's study in New Zealand, except for master's and PhD students who will continue to be eligible for a three-year post study work visa.

Whether you are in fully catered or self-catered, students can either choose to bring their own linen, or purchase a linen pack for \$160 (Single/King Single). Each pack includes a duvet inner, pillow(s), sheet set, duvet cover set and towels.

Limited reserved parking is available on site at our Hamilton Halls of Residences. Applications are open in January of each University year and are offered on a first in first served basis. Alternatively, you can purchase a License to Hunt Permit via the 'Pay my Park' app, to park at one of the various University car parks.

FULLY CATERED ACCOMMODATION

This option provides you with your own single bedroom, shared bathroom and dining facilities with other students. Three healthy meals a day, seven days a week are provided. A bed and mattress protector are provided in all bedrooms.

SELF-CATERED ACCOMMODATION

This style of accommodation is suitable for all students. In Hamilton, self-catered accommodation is shared with other students, each student with their own bedroom and some options available with own bathroom. Cooking and cleaning is shared between the groups and all basic necessities are provided. For our graduate and more mature students, we also offer independent apartments. Each apartment has its own kitchen, bathroom, living/study space and bedroom with queen bed.

Our Tauranga accommodation offers 91 studio rooms each with their own ensuite. Cleaning of common areas is completed by a housekeeper. Full kitchen facilities are available for students to cook for themselves or communally with other residents. OTHER ACCOMMODATION OPTIONS

Homestay

Homestay accommodation is ideal for students who prefer a family-oriented lifestyle. Homestay (living with a local family in a private home) may be compulsory for international students under the age of 18 years. You will be provided with your own room and most meals are provided by the homestay family. Homestays are located close to a bus route to the campus. The cost of homestay accommodation is NZ\$343 a week, including food, power, laundry, but does not include phone, internet and transport costs. A non-refundable application fee of NZ\$450 and the first four weeks of homestay (NZ\$1,822) must be paid before a homestay placement can be made.

Flatting

Many of our students choose to share accommodation with others in a private house located off campus – this is known as 'flatting'. The approximate cost of flatting for each person (based on recent figures with two to four flatmates) is between NZ\$180 - \$320 per week for a room, excluding food and utilities. Prior to arrival in New Zealand you can search online for flats or available rooms. We recommend you arrive at least two weeks before trimester starts in order to find suitable accommodation and get settled. Renting

You can rent a house in a nearby residential suburb for you and your family for approximately NZ\$500 - \$650 per week for a three bedroom home, excluding utilities and food.

SCHOLARSHIPS

VICE-CHANCELLOR'S INTERNATIONAL EXCELLENCE SCHOLARSHIP SUITE

Up to NZD \$15,000

These scholarships are awarded to new undergraduate and postgraduate international students studying onshore who can demonstrate academic excellence in their previous studies. The scholarships are merit based and contribute up to NZD \$15,000 towards tuition fees. Five different scholarships programmes are available - one each for China, India, Malaysia, Vietnam and one for the rest of the world.

UNIVERSITY OF WAIKATO INTERNATIONAL ENTRANCE SCHOLARSHIP FOR SCHOOL LEAVERS

Up to NZD \$15,000

This scholarship is for onshore international students who have met direct entry from a New Zealand high school in the year prior to enrolling in an undergraduate degree programme. Students who achieve University Entrance in NCEA will receive automatically NZD \$10,000 towards tuition fees in their first year of study. In addition, students who achieve NCEA with merit endorsement will receive an additional NZD \$3,000 in their second year and students who achieve NCEA with excellence endorsement will receive an additional NZD \$2,000 in their third year. No application is required, the scholarship is automatically applied.

UNIVERSITY OF WAIKATO DOCTORAL SCHOLARSHIPS

Up to NZD \$100,000 scholarship

The University of Waikato Doctoral Scholarships are open to full-time international doctoral students studying at the University.

Successful applicants will receive up to NZD \$30,000 a year for up to three years full-time study (payable in monthly instalments), plus domestic tuition and the Student Services Fees during the term of the scholarship.

To be considered for a scholarship, students must receive an Offer of Place in the doctoral programme prior to one of the four selection meetings each year.

UNIVERSITY OF WAIKATO RESEARCH MASTERS SCHOLARSHIP

Up to NZD \$15,000

As part of our commitment to graduate research, the University supports students undertaking a master's thesis at the University. To be eligible, students should be intending to enrol full-time in a 593 or 594 paper as part of their first master's degree at the University and have completed at least 120 points of study at a New Zealand university.

CASE STUDIES

Many of our programmes require students to develop a case study on a particular issue, question or problem on behalf of a local organisation. Students get the opportunity to learn first-hand how an organisation functions, by working through a case study with other students, then presenting the solution to the employer.

EMPLOYABILITY PLUS PROGRAMME

The Employability Plus Programme (EPP) gives University of Waikato students the opportunity to gain work-ready skills through volunteer activity, university participation and attending workshops. EPP is an easy way to connect with dozens of local non-profits and looks great on your resume. You'll receive an official EPP Supplementary Record when you graduate, which outlines all of the ways you've been involved on-campus and in the wider community. When you are job hunting, the practical skills and experience that you've gained will help you stand out to prospective employers.

STUDY ABROAD

Already enrolled at a university? If so, consider studying at Waikato for one or two trimesters as a study abroad student.

Be part of a vibrant community of students from all over the world. Participate in student clubs, live with local students, explore our beautiful country, or complete an internship (through the Study + Intern Programme) all while receiving a world class education.

Papers (courses/unit/modules) can selected from across the University and almost all papers are open to study abroad students, making it easy to get the credits you need. Some of our most popular papers taken by Study Abroad students are unique papers focusing on New Zealand and Māori culture. To apply as a study abroad student, you must:

- Have a minimum B grade average (equivalencies may vary by country).
- Meet English Language proficiency requirements.
- Have completed at least one year of full-time study and be currently enrolled at a recognised overseas tertiary institution.

You may apply directly or use the services of a study abroad agency. Study abroad students pay a set fee that includes tuition, additional charges and official transcript. The study abroad fee excludes costs such as insurance, accommodation, text books and field trips.

ENGLISH + STUDY ABROAD PROGRAMME

If you do not meet English proficiency requirements, you can enrol in an English language programme and increase your overall IELTS level by 0.5. The English language programme takes 8-10 weeks and is completed just prior to beginning your main trimester.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE PREPARATION PROGRAMMES FOR ENTRY TO UNIVERSITY

The Academic English (Certificate of Attainment in English Language or Certificate of Attainment in Academic English) programme focuses on maximising your progress in each of the four core English skills – speaking, writing, reading, and listening. FOUNDATION STUDIES

The University offers foundation programmes on the Hamilton campus for high school students who have not met the academic requirements for entry into degree study. This programme is offered either as a standard (30 week/two trimesters) programme or an accelerated (15 week/one trimester) programme.



Foundation Studies classes are shared with domestic students (except for English classes) which encourages international students to improve their English and make local friends. Classes are held on the same campus as all degree programmes, which helps students to become familiar with the campus and the way the University works.

INTERNATIONAL DIPLOMA – BUSINESS OR COMPUTER SCIENCE

The International Diplomas combine the first year of the relevant bachelor's degree with a programme of English Language, academic support, and development activities to provide you with direct-entry to the second year of the bachelor's programme.

International Diplomas are the perfect option for students who narrowly missed out on meeting the criteria for direct entry to the Bachelor of Business, Bachelor of Science or Bachelor of Computer Science programmes. International Diplomas are available in Business and Computer Science and are recognised by all New Zealand universities.

Business

Providing direct-entry into the second year of the Bachelor of Business, this diploma is delivered in partnership with the Waikato Management School – a Triple Crown accredited, internationally recognised business school ranked in the top one percent worldwide. Students gain real-world experience while studying towards the Bachelor of Business through the work-integrated learning project.

Progression

Successful completion of 120 points in the International Diploma (Business) enables students to progress to any majors offered in the Bachelor of Business at the University of Waikato.

English language entry requirements:

An overall IELTS (Academic) score of 5.5 (with no less than 5.0 in any band) or equivalent.

Computer Science

Providing direct-entry into the second year of a Bachelor of Computer Science and selected majors in the Bachelor of Science, this diploma is delivered in partnership with the School of Computing and Mathematical Sciences. Students will gain practical experience in labs equipped with some of the most up-to-date, high tech, computing facilities in New Zealand. Both degrees also include opportunities to work on projects with New Zealand companies through the work-integrated learning project.

Progression

Successful completion of 120 points in the International Diploma (Computer Science) enables students to progress to the Bachelor of Computer Science.

English language entry requirements:

An overall IELTS (Academic) score of 5.5 (with no less than 5.0 in any band) or equivalent.

DIPLOMA IN POSTGRADUATE PREPARATION – PRE MASTERS (DIPPP)

The Diploma in Postgraduate Preparation – Pre Masters (DipPP) is an eight-month (twotrimester) Level 7 diploma that aims to prepare international students for postgraduate studies at the School of Health School of Computing and School of Arts, School of Social Sciences and the Institute of Security and Crime Science and Mathematical Sciences or the Waikato Management School, which is a Triple-Crown accredited business school.

The DipPP provides international students, who either do not have the equivalent of a

New Zealand bachelors degree or do not meet the requirements for direct entry, with an alternative pathway into a masters programme at the University of Waikato.

Delivered by the University of Waikato College, the programme teaches English language, academic literacies and the personal and professional skills that students need to succeed with postgraduate studies at a New Zealand university. Upon successful completion of the Diploma in Postgraduate Preparation - Pre-Masters, students can progress to one of the following postgraduate degrees:

- Master of Applied Finance
- Master of Business and Management
- Master of Digital Business
- Master of Information Technology
- Master of Legal Studies
- Master of Management in Supply Chain Management
- Master of Nursing Practice
- Master of Professional Accounting
- Master of Technology Innovation in Business

This programme may also be extended to other University of Waikato conversion masters qualifications.

PhD – Health, Sport and Human Performance

My research project involves testing the validity and reliability of the Calf Raise App, an app that tracks and quantifies calf muscle performance across a different range of individuals, from youth to elderly and sedentary to high-level athletes. To compare the outcomes of the apps to gold-standard research equipment, I have been fortunate to use the facilities at the University's Adams Centre of High Performance in Tauranga.

I also enjoy being based at the new Tauranga city campus. The dedicated space for postgraduate students, including a kitchen and coffee machine, is convenient when I spend long hours writing my thesis.

During your studies, it is important to be kind to yourself and practise self-care. Tauranga is a beautiful place to live, so I like to take long walks to discover more of its sights. I find walking, reading and practicing yoga is good self-care for me.

3	How to apply Apply to study at Waikato at <mark>waikato.ac.nz/international/how-to-apply</mark> or apply through one of our agents (see above)
4	Receiving an offer If your application is successful you will receive an offer to study at Waikato. Your offer will be either a formal offer (not conditional on anything) or a conditional offer. If your offer is conditional you may need to enrol in a pathway programme to meet your entry requirements, or you may need to provide further information to us. You can only start your student visa application process with a formal offer.
5	Accept your offer – pay your first year's tuition fees You can accept your formal offer by logging into your MyWaikato and clicking the 'accept offer' button. Visit waikato.ac.nz/ international/how-to-accept-and-pay-fees for more information. Here you will find information on how to pay your fees. The university provides several different payment options.
6	Apply for your student visa You can apply for your student visa before paying the fee. Please visit immigration.govt.nz for more information on student visas. Once you have received your AIP (Approval in Principal) from Immigration New Zealand, you can then pay your first year's fees or the first programme's fee if you are applying for a pathway student visa.
7	Preparing to come to New Zealand To ensure you arrive in New Zealand with everything you need to complete your enrolment at the University, and to settle into your new home, please visit waikato.ac.nz/study/international/preparing-to-come-to-nz. We will also send you a series of emails about what you need to do.
8	Enrolment on campus To officially enrol at the University, you will need to show your student visa and any other required documentation, including evidence of medical and travel insurances, or purchase the University's insurance policy. Online students do not need a student visa or insurance, but must still pay the student services levy.
9	Arriving in New Zealand You can arrange to be collected from the airport for free by the University. If you choose to do this, you will be delivered to your accommodation. You can find the arrival form at waikato.ac.nz/international/preparing-to-come-to-nz/arrival-form
